The Queen's skirts stayed dry

In mid-December, just one day after the contractors finished their meticulous, months-long work raising the Queen Mary

three feet above her historic level, a big nor'easter hit the Maine Midcoast at high tide. The northeast winds and surging tide pushed a huge amount of water into Muscongus Bay. Had that beloved old ship's chandlery still rested on her original footings, the lab level would have been sloshing with sea water. Instead, the Queen Mary remained dry.

Friends of Hog Island has been working closely with National Audubon facilities manager Eric Snyder for several years to pull off this engineering feat — Eric handling the complex permitting and planning, FOHI providing the funding, which totaled \$270,000. The risk from rising sea levels and ever-higher storm tides

have kept many of us awake at night for years. Now we can sleep a little easier. More on this project is elsewhere in the newsletter.

Sadly, our dear friend Walt Pomeroy, who with his wife Lin were the angels who largely underwrote the Queen Mary project, did not live to see the results of his generosity. Walt was one of three valued friends of FOHI we lost in the past year, and

whose lives are celebrated elsewhere in this issue of *The Guillemot*.

Meanwhile, we're gearing up for a very full summer camp season, one that builds on the terrific success of 2022. Camp ran like a Swiss watch, under modified (but still cautious) Covid guidelines and now-permanent changes like outdoor dining, a pandemic precaution that has proven so popular with campers, staff and FOHI we're keeping it for good. Our new volunteer coordinator Adam DiNuovo was a rock star, fitting seamlessly into the position he took over from his predecessor, Tony Ferrera. (Tony was back on the island to help as a FOHI on a number of occasions over the summer. so fortunately he's not going to be a

stranger.) Adam is busy filling volunteer slots for this summer, so if you're planning to come to the island to help and haven't staked out your spot for one of the sessions, don't wait. It's going to be a terrific year, and we'd hate to miss you.

More about Raising the Queen Mary

By now, you know that the venerable Queen Mary building is safe for the foreseeable future from rising sea levels. Its raising started last October and was finished on Dec. 10, 2022, when the last of the crew left the island. They worked almost every day despite chilling wind, rain, cold, varying high tides, rough water, and their daily commute of 90 minutes by road, then a boat ride to the island!

For quite a few years FOHI and Audubon had been talking about raising the Queen Mary and pondering the cost. FOHI was keen to pay for the project but needed an estimate before committing. After a long search Audubon's facilities manager, Eric Snyder, found a company that could handle such a huge task in a short time – Jewett Builders of Pittston, Maine. As you can imagine, such a project has a lot of surveying and permitting required before the actual project begins. In early 2021, all the pieces began to coalesce.

On March 3, 2021, Walt and Lin Pomeroy called Friends of Hog Island to say that they would make the lead gift so that the project could start in earnest. They knew FOHI's annual appeal would go out shortly thereafter and hoped others would follow their lead and donate. For Walt and Lin, this project was an example and a warning about climate change; they wanted to do something before it was too late. Walt was hoping to see work begin in October 2021 but the permitting process took longer than expected, and came too late to start as planned. Work was postponed until October 2022, right after the closing of camp for the season. It was an ambitious timetable of 10 weeks. But all involved were eager and ready to get the job done.

There remain some odds-and-ends tasks that Eric, facilities assistant Adrian Bregy and the opening week FOHI crew will tackle in June to bring the building back to full operation. But this enormous project, which Eric managed and FOHI paid for, was a sterling example of the partnership between Audubon and Friends of Hog Island. Walt and Lin's lead was the impetus that pulled us all together to make it happen, and it stands as a worthy memorial to Walt's memory.

A note from Juanita Roushdy. . .

Nature knows all too well about change and takes it in stride. We humans must do the same. I first set foot on Hog Island in 2007 as a camper, positive that I should not have come; I knew no one. While waiting for other campers to arrive I took a walk on the east side of the island, along the gnarly, mossladen rocky path overlooking Muscongus Bay. Just thinking about it still makes my heart quicken and eyes moisten.

Many of you experienced the same thing. Your lives changed because of your time on Hog Island. It settled into your soul, quietly waiting to stir and overflow. In October 2009, I moved to Maine, because of Hog Island and a female American Redstart, and became a full-time volunteer there. The island had called and I had to answer. Fourteen years later, after founding the nonprofit Friends of Hog Island and working with the wonderful board, volunteers, alumni, friends, and Audubon staff, I find change again beckons.

Because of all those who make up FOHI and who had faith in our mission and vision, including yourselves, the Hog Island Audubon Camp has now become strong, financially sound, enjoys the full support of National Audubon, and faces an exciting future with new ideas and youthful energy. Likewise, FOHI has become a much-respected and valued partner of National Audubon and our volunteers continue to give their all. The camp cannot help but prosper with such a deeply committed partner.

Personal responsibilities and medical events prompt my stepping down as FOHI's Executive Director on October 1, 2023. I am working closely with the FOHI board to determine the
